Coral Car: Night Reef

Jan Ross-Manley has worked a lifetime in the arts with diverse practice encompassing community arts, teaching and workshop facilitating, also curating of exhibitions for Australia and overseas. She has held a number of solo shows and her work is represented in many public art collections. She is currently preparing for an exhibition on The Great Barrier Reef that will celebrate this living treasure on our threshold.



Night Reef features some surreal formations of reef building coral (identified by polyps with multiples of six tentacles as distinct from soft corals that have multiples of eight tentacles). Green turtles and manta rays are also located in the area. (Image: courtesy of the artist)

Gladstone sits at the start of the Southern Great Barrier Reef, with the Capricornia and Bunker groups centred in the region. The Reef is probably the most precious resource in the Gladstone Region; providing a tourism and recreational base that generates economic benefit for the whole area. The Reef is also very topical due to the threat of climate change, as the reef is a bio indicator for the overall state of the planet. Not commonly known is that much reef activity happens after dark on this natural wonderland. This work is inspired by research Jan is currently doing for her upcoming exhibition.

High Vizzz William Debois

Self-employed photographer, William Debois of Photopia Studio enjoys the Central Queensland sunshine and friendly atmosphere. With more than twenty years of portraiture experience, William recently hosted his first solo exhibition in the region, *The Sea I Swim In* documenting his experiences dealing with depression.

The issue of gender is a part of our conversation as transgender people are becoming more visible. Gender isn't as simple as boy or girl. They aren't going to 'get over it'. They are not 'confused'. They are brave and strong in a world that tells them that essentially how they were born is wrong. Playing around with cartooning since her teens, for a while Jenny contributed works to a couple of magazines in NZ in the early 1990's. She has never created a cartoon image on quite this scale before so it was quite a challenge, especially navigating the whole digital art process.

Jenny created this character as a tribute to the 'super-heroes' of Council who do all those important jobs for us that we don't think about until it all goes wrong. With his trusty retro machine, no job is too big or small. She also said, "what more could you ask for than a man operating a vacuum cleaner?"



Artist Series Belynda (Bindi) Waugh

Road Services Mount Larcom and Street Sweeper

An indigenous artist living in Yarwun, 20km north of Gladstone, Bindi works across a range of disciplines, including writing and illustrating children's books, public art commissions, ceramics and works on canvas. With a large number of awards for work, including The 42nd Rio Tinto Martin Hanson Memorial Art Awards 2017 Local Murri Artist Award, sponsored by Elizabeth and Leo Zussino, Bindi's Tilt installation, fabricated by Urban Art Projects, will be featured in the newly developed Rockhampton Riverside Precinct.

The series includes eleven works: Nuruv (Vine), Bingin (Turtle), Jinir-Jinir (Night Owl) and Gibam (Moon), Dugan (Mountain), Junbung (Platypus), Wulan (Grass), Gibam (Moon), Magil (Gecko), Jagun (Land), Balun (River), Wurahn (Grass). Titled with Bundjalung language from Northern NSW, her great grandfather's people, Bindi's works celebrate the landscapes, flora and fauna of the Gladstone Region. "This is a wonderful way to bring art off the walls of galleries and homes and into the street," she

said. "It breathes a second life into the work with a different context and a new audience to engage. It is not there to tell you what to do or to get you to buy something. It is there just to add some colour to your day in an unexpected way."
