He explains his povonsness by saying he was just in receipt of eleven letters to It is gread to know things are going an so well at hane. I am still keeping as good as ever, considering my position. In a way I am by no means downbearted, for we are a happy family here and lave pleuty of fun in one way or another. The Frenchmen we are working with are regular hard cases, and help to keep our spirits up. Last Sunday week we went into the city to draw packets (supplies from England). There are seven of as Englishmen here and between us we drew no less than two hundred packets, so we are by no means in want of anything. In my spare time I am learning French - my tutor is a regular hard case. of hisself and three mates taken at the Lager by a young Russian prisoner, He certainly looks well. Reported "Killed in action" 11 April 1917. Revised to Prisoner of War 21 July 1917. Captured Reincourt 11 April 1917. Interned Limburg. Received Red Cross Parcels. Repatriated Hull, 1 January 1919. 10 February 1920 Next of kin advised returning to Australia. Discharged 20 May 1920.
